What a good idea for helping readers to find the ones that may be most applicable! Starting this issue, I've decided to try this. We'll start off with three management cases: a rare small business succession case, a strategic partnership case and an uncomfortable employee situation. In the area of higher education, we have a good practice AACSB self-study case and anyone who has spent any time in university teaching will identify with at least parts of Coup d'état case, although the protagonist has a particularly difficult mess. These are followed with a quartet of dentistry cases; they have their own group of problems. Lastly, another quartet this time of accounting cases – cost accounting, valuation, forensic accounting and non-profit.

I hope you note that many of these cases have new-to-SECRJ authors. While I'm delighted that we are gaining new authors, that doesn't leave our "regulars" off the hook. I was only able to get enough cases for one journal this year. Unlike many journals, we regularly go from first submission to publication in less than a year — and that's with an acceptance rate in the low to mid 30s percent. (THANK-YOU to all my reviewers!!!)
